Zoning Board Approves Community Center

n the evening of Wednesday, March 28, 2012 at the Town of Mashpee Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) meeting, our Tribe received a height variance unanimous vote approval from the Mashpee ZBA for the new Mashpee

Wampanoag Tribe Community Government Center building. It was a long, thoughtful, professional and artful presentation by our team to the Mashpee ZBA.

The ZBA vote was unanimous! We are victorious. We have to complete a few engineering components and submit, within the next 20 days and we are final. We will successfully have permits to commence construction of the new 43,000 square foot, \$12.7 million USDA funded Tribal Community Government building. We'll have the final engineering components submitted by next week via our Civil Engineer Mark Dibb. Bid-packages for general contracting will commence mid-April, 2012.

I want to thank Tribal Council members that attended & involved with the project Treasurer Mark Harding along with Councilwoman Trish Keliinui and tribal members that attended Yvonne Tobey, Daryl Frye Sr., John Peters Jr., Chef John Marcellino & wife his Robin, David Weeden, Jim Rossignol and David Green.

ing rapidly. We have acquired an option to purchase additional land in the Liberty and Union Industrial Park. At press time, this land includes 135 acres near Routes 24 and 140. We are still considering whether additional land acquisition will make sense for our project and we will continue to inform you as decisions are made.

Part of the Massachusetts Gaming Law says that residents of a "host community" must approve any proposed gaming development. We think this is a positive and important step in developing a destination resort casino in Taunton. Providing an opportunity for the residents of Taunton to learn about the pros and cons of hosting a resort casino and allowing them to have a say on what they feel is best for their community is the right thing to do. The initial reaction from the people of Taunton has been very positive; as many people look forward to the additional jobs and revenue we can bring to their city. We continue to work closely with city

officials to make this happen, and the referendum will be held on Saturday, June 9.

To prepare for the June 9 vote, a ballot question committee has been established to help educate the residents of Taunton about the project and support a "yes" vote for a destination resort casino. This committee is separate from Tribal operations and is set up under Massachusetts Election Laws. However, there are opportunities for Tribal members to get involved and support a positive vote in Taunton. A limited number of paid opportunities will become available. If you are interested in working for the committee, please contact Yvonne Tobey in the WIA Department. There are also many opportunities to volunteer on this effort. As always, please know that your opinion on the future of our economic development plans in Taunton is important. I welcome your input, as does the Tribal Council. However,

I do want to address the difference between constructive dialogue - one in which we may not agree but will listen to each other respectfully - and a dialogue that is hostile and does nothing but prevent us from reaching our goals. I know that I am not always perfect in this regard, but I am committed to doing better. I also ask each Tribal citizen to make a commitment to continuing to be involved and voicing your opinions, but doing it in a respectful, constructive manner.

This project, along with our other initiatives, is too important to get bogged down. Together, we will bring economic self-sufficiency to our Tribe and provide the best in services to our people. Together, we can continue this spring awakening for the Mashpee Wampanoag Nation.

Tribal Administrator:

Suffolk University Presents a Seminar on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples

he theme of the Eleventh Session of the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (UNPFII), which is held in May in New York, is "The Doctrine of Discovery: its enduring impact on indigenous peoples and the right to redress for past conquests (article 28 and 37 of the United Nations Declaration on the rights of Indigenous Peoples)". Additionally, the United Nations Special Rapporteur on the rights of indigenous peoples will make his first official country visit to the United States April 23 - May 4, 2012. Special Rapporteur is a title given to individuals working on behalf of various regional and international organizations who bear specific mandates to investigate, monitor and recommend solutions to specific human rights problems.

In recognition of these two events and their relevance to the impact that international human rights law can have for Native American tribes and communities in their advocacy efforts, Suffolk University Law School Indian Law and Indigenous Peoples Clinic has developed and will present a Travelling Seminar on the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP).

The goals of the seminar include providing an overview of the rights contained in UNDRIP and an explanation of its legal status, increasing awareness of UNDRIP and human rights bodies addressing indigenous peoples rights, specifically UNPFII and the Special Rapporteur, providing an opportunity for tribes to discuss individual or collectively

how to incorporate UNDRIP into their advocacy with neighboring communities, as well as, state and federal governments, and fostering a discussion around how the UN Declaration and regional international human rights advocacy could benefit them.

The seminar will be held Friday, April 20, 2012 from 10:00 AM – 12:00 PM. The Mashpee Wampanoag ICWA department has graciously offered the use of their training room at Madaket Place, 766 Falmouth Road, Unit A7, 3rd Floor, Mashpee for the seminar.
