Historic Preservation Commission

he Tribal Historic Preservation Department seeks to establish a 7-member Mashpee Wampanoag Historic Preservation Commission (MWHPC). The Commission will provide advice to the Tribal Historic Preservation Officer on decisions related to preserving tribal culture, history, language, historical sites, structures, cultural items, burial sites, and other sites of significance.

Wanted: Two tribal members who are interested and knowledgeable of the Mashpee Wampanoag history, culture, and land use practices of our ancestors who are willing to serve as Historic Preservation Commissioners

Duties: Attend meetings once a month (maximum of 2 hours per meeting), offer advice and guidance to THPO for developing protection plans of important cultural sites and items. The Terms will be two years.

The Historic Preservation Commission includes:

- 1. Chairperson of the Mashpee Wampanoag Tribal Museum (or appointee)
- 2. Chairperson of the Mashpee Old Indian Meetinghouse House Committee (or appointee)
- 3. The Tribal Chief (or appointee)
- 4. The Tribal Historic Preservation Officer
- 5. The Tribal Medicine Person (or appointee)
- 6. Tribal member
- 7. Tribal member

- » Recent copy of your primary heating/utility bill
- » Recent payroll stub for everyone in household 18 years of age and over (income will be calculated on a yearly basis)





Documentation showing Social Security, Unemployment, Pension fund, Disability, Selfemployment (1099), businesses owned companies.

- » Final Utility Termination Notice (Shut-off notice)
- » Proof of present address, Mortgage Bill/deed, Lease, property tax bill
- » Proof of total members living in your household (School Records, tax records, etc.)
- » Social Security Card for all members living in your household
- » Proof of Citizenship (Green Card),

You are instrumental to our children's future and you are role models for them today.

Thank you to all involved in making the first year of our very own IHS Health Services Clinic such a great success. The ability to provide primary care to our people on our own land is a great stride forward for our tribe. Thank you also to all those who have worked to provide culturally-appropriate support to Tribal members in need through counseling, diabetes care and prevention, substance abuse prevention and support, and many other programs.

Thank you to our Elders and traditional leaders for providing wisdom, guidance, and spiritual support. Thank you for providing a connection to our traditions and for passing them on to our young people. To our Chief, Medicine Man, Chief's

Circle, and Clan Mothers and others – thank you!

Thank you to our Housing Department, which works hard every day to help Tribal members access safe, affordable, warm housing in our homeland. I am especially excited about the innovative programs being administered by the Housing Department to keep people in their homes and to acquire new housing. I look forward to even more progress in the coming year on the Meetinghouse Road housing development.

Congratulations to all who have been involved in our Community and Government Center. From the Development Department, to Buildings and Grounds, to the Project Management team, to the Tribal members working on the construction site, to all the employees who were flexible in moving their office space to accommodate the project, I thank you. This project is so exciting for our Tribe and is progressing rapidly.

Thank you to our Finance team for a successful, comprehensive first-ever annual budget, for implementation of a new software system, for a clean audit, and for professionalizing all of our financial systems.

Thank you to all who have made our annual events such an incredible success. Our entire Tribe should be proud of our Mashpee Wampanoag Ball, our Annual Powwow, the Youth Sobriety Powwow, services at the Old Indian Meeting House, Thanksgiving Turkey Giveaway, Breakfast with Santa, and more.

I also want to acknowledge the real progress we made in 2012 on our economic development goal of building

a destination resort casino in Taunton. We have met every milestone on our way to bringing jobs and revenue to our Tribe, Taunton, and the Commonwealth through this project. Just this year, we acquired an option on land in Taunton, reached an Intergovernmental Agreement with the City of Taunton, won an overwhelming vote in the referendum to approve our project in Taunton, negotiated a compact with Governor Patrick that was also passed by the legislature, initiated both state and federal environmental reviews, completed our application for land in trust for the properties in both Mashpee and Taunton, and much more. This could not have been accomplished without the assistance of literally hundreds of Tribal members. Now, we look forward to renegotiating a compact with Governor Patrick, which will then be passed by the legislature and approved by the Department of Interior, and to receiving a positive determination on our application for land in trust.

It's impossible to list all of the exciting things that have happened in the last year. It is truly awe-inspiring to think about the incredible progress we have made together and how much we have to look forward to in 2013. With committed people working cooperatively, positively, and with a focus on our future, there is nothing we can't accomplish. Let's keep our momentum going!

Education Department Update

The Education Department is very involved with Indian Education within the Mashpee Schools. The Department is currently doing a survey of New Bedford and of other communities on Cape Cod to help provide guidelines for schools so students are learning more about Native American heritage and therefore give all Natives a more supportive and representative education.

Child Care Services

The Child Care Services has a heavy workload servicing our tribal families. The program has serviced over 41 families and will continue to offer services to other tribal families.

Our Child Care Services team is working with providers, tribal families and continues to work steadfastly to streamline the child care waiting list.

If you are in need, or will need, child care services please request an application as soon as possible. This grant

can serve all Native Americans (federal and state recognized) in our five contiguous counties.

Native Tribal Scholars Program

Currently the NTS Program is working with 36 tribal students throughout the Commonwealth of Massachusetts. Staff is currently planning events through the academic year.

The NTS Program grant has been funded again and the North American Indian Center of Boston (NAICOB) in partnership with the Tribe administer the NTS grant and plan to offer a summer program in a college setting. This grant is funded by the Office of Indian Education in the Federal Department of Education. There are many components to this program including preparing for college entrance tests and learning about tribal heritage.
